



GUIDE TO GRADUATION
College Holds Graduation Ceremony on May 16



Prospective graduates, here at a glance is what you need to know and must do to participate in Commencement on May 16.

Graduation requirements are as follows:

- Completion of all academic program requirements in January, June or August 2015
- Graduation packet filed and approved by the appropriate dean by April 1
- A minimum cumulative grade point average (G.P.A.) of 2.0
- Any outstanding College debts satisfied
- A College ID is required to receive a cap and gown at any location

BLACKWOOD – Some students say a lack, or poor planning, of campus events leads to a lack of unity among students. Other students say that is not why they are here.

Part of Camden County College’s vision is to serve as a destination for cultural and recreational activities. However, CCC has become more of a brief stop on the road to success instead of an experience for some students.

With around 20,000 students enrolled each year, Jacqueline Tenuto, Assistant Dean for Student Development and Support, believes her most important role is connecting people. Yet it has been more difficult for her in the last few years.

“People have so much to do outside of school they don’t have time,” Tenuto said.



Warning: Look Both Ways Before Crossing the Street

Next to the illegal drug industry, human and child trafficking is the largest criminal enterprise. Multinational and out of control, it's a crisis left to ignorance to much of the population, however common it may be.

What exactly is Human Trafficking? Human Trafficking is the illegal recruitment of men, women, and children by threat or coercion for sexual exploitation and/or forced labor. Most trafficking is national or regional, but there are also notable cases of long-distance trafficking. Human trafficking affects every country of the world, as countries of origin, transit and/or destination. The Americas are prominent both as the origin and destination of victims of human trafficking, according to the website www.unodc.org.

Human Trafficking: Often 'Hidden' In Front of us

For urgent situations call 911.

While the victims may sometimes be kept behind locked doors, they are

often hidden right in front of us at, for example, construction sites, restaurants, elder care centers, nail salons, agricultural fields, and hotels.

How can we spot out possible trafficking? According to a source who wished to remain anonymous, here are some key characteristics and red flags that could alert you to a potential

works 40 hours a week and teaches a children's karate class.

trafficking situation that should be reported:

- Poor living conditions.
- Living with employer.
- Inability to speak to individual alone.
- Multiple people in cramped space.
- Employer is holding identity documents.
- Answers appear to be scripted and rehearsed.
- Submissive or fearful.
- Signs of physical abuse.
- Unpaid or paid very little.
- Under 18 and in prostitution...

This source say that if you have the opportunity to ask the potential victim questions, here are some follow up questions to the red flags you became alerted to without jeopardizing the victim's safety because the potential trafficker is watching: Can you (the possible victim) come and go as you please? Can you leave your job if you want to? Have you been hurt or threatened if you tried to leave? Do you live with your employer? Has your family been threatened? Are you in dept to your employer? Where do you sleep and eat? Do you have your passport/identification? Who has it?

Steps to Elude a Kidnapping

(Organizations and persons familiar with human trafficking advise to) **always play it safe:** If you're walking in a public area, always be aware of who's around. Whenever you're out you should always make it a point to spot an escape route and when eating out never face a wall. Rather than drowning yourself out with headphones, always be attentive, and go with your gut instinct if you're getting a sketchy vibe from someone. It's never a bad idea to duck into a store, changing your route, where there are plenty of other people.


Have a plan: The attacker gains the upper hand on his victim due to the element of surprise in his favor, but you can prepare yourself by assessing the situation before anything happens. It's helpful to rehearse possible scenarios in your mind so you'll be able to act quicker and more instinctively.

Prepare to resist: It's never a bad idea to carry mace (pepper spray). If you don't have this, use your keys on the end of your key-chain, and thrust across the attacker's eyes. Now, if there are multiple armed attackers seeking ransom who attempt to abduct you in an isolated or hostile place where there is realistically little to no chance of escape, you should be cooperative from the beginning. About 95% of people abducted in this manner are released alive, and the chance of being killed is highest in the first few minutes of the abduction, when something goes wrong — usually when the victim tries to escape or fight. If the would-be abductor is unarmed, if the attempt is sexually motivated, and if you are in the vicinity of other people and can quickly get help, you should fight or do anything you possibly can to escape the attacker. This is the case in most abduction attacks in the United States and developed countries, and it's also usually the case if the intended victim is a woman or child.

Run: If you've made the quick decision to get away, it's best to run to a public area where there are plenty of witnesses, and if able put yourself in sight and accessibility of a police officer. Don't stop! You may be running awhile, but if it's between you and the attacker; run as fast and steady as you can, and always keep a sharp look out for safety. If you do make it to a populated area, and the attacker has caught up and still fighting, fight back. Make a scene; yell to get help (don't scream! It only further irritates the attacker!), even grab someone if necessary. Unfortunately people aren't always willing to intervene even if witnessing the attack happen, but when it's life or death, you make them listen.

Fight dirty. Do whatever you need to get away: this isn't a boxing match. Pick up and wield any heavy object that is close at hand. If you have mace, pepper spray, or a stun gun, use it. (If you own these weapons, practice with them. A weapon forgotten in a purse is useless. This takes practice. Don't just feel safe because you have it on you. Not knowing how to use your weapon merely gives the attacker another tool to use against you.) If an abductor grabs hold of you, don't be afraid or ashamed to make use of your teeth. The seconds you need to escape can be achieved by stunning him with an extreme action like biting off part of an ear, finger, or nose.

Aim for sensitive spots. Poke the abductor in the eyes; hit or kick the groin, nose, throat, or kidneys; scrape your foot hard against his shin; stomp on the top of his foot with your heel, or stomp out sideways into his knee. Your elbows, knees, and the palm of your hand are good striking weapons. Your closed fist can be effectively used like a hammer. but don't throw punches; without training, you're more likely to break your hand than hurt your attacker. Make your strikes count and do not stop until there is no chance that the attacker will have the ability to continue his attack. One good blow is not enough; it may stun them and make them angry. The idea is to stop the assault, and that requires a



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

critical amount of damage to be inflicted on the opponent. Your aim is never to kill the opponent, just to stop the attack! Death may simply be a side effect of the effort needed to stop the attack. Whatever you do, once you have started the offensive, do not stop until there is no doubt that you can get away safely. They are angry now, and probably run faster than you. Hit with elbows and knees until the assailant is no longer capable of pursuing the attack. Then go get the police. Do not flail. Flailing and using your nails wildly will only cause what the police call "defensive marks" on the attacker, and usually only provides forensic evidence on your dead body.

Make up stories: You should do *anything* to make the attacker think he/she is as unsafe as possible. Examples: "I have anhydrous diabetic chronic pneumonia [made-up disease]. I have to take my medication every three hours, or I'll die. If you take me, you're looking at murder charges, no matter what."

Look for *anything* that seems official, and assert that it has cameras: "There's an ATM right there. You know they all have hidden cameras, right?" Or if you see anything that *remotely* looks like a camera, "You know that's a security camera, right?"

It is best to call the police, but if for some reason you cannot (due to a lost cell phone), you should always tell an attacker that police are on the way. "I dialed the panic button from my cell phone, police are on the way. Just run now, and you'll be safe."

If you are in your neighborhood *lie* and say that a neighbor or the neighborhood itself has cameras and/ neighborhood watch where they report *any* suspicious behavior. Anyways if you are on a neighborhood street there would be at least five people in their homes so they would hear you. Another thing to do if in a neighborhood or near a house pretend as if you live there and you just going home. *Do not* show that it's not your house. Either knock or pretend to knock on the door and say your mom/dad/ brother/sister/friends name to act like your waiting for them to open the door.

If you now believe you've identified someone still in the trafficking or trafficked position, or you yourself have been put in such a position, such as kidnapped, and/or sold for sexual exploitation and/or forced labor, alert the law enforcement immediately. It may not be safe to attempt rescuing the trafficking victim; you have to know how the trafficker will react and retaliate towards the victim and you.

For urgent situations call 911. Also, alert the National Human Trafficking Resource Center: Call 1-(888)-373-7888; sms 233733 (text HELP or INFO); in service 24 hours, 7 days a week. Languages: English, Spanish and 200 more languages.

Commencement Day Schedule

Commencement is a dignified occasion. We ask that those attending the ceremony conduct themselves in an appropriate manner. The College community appreciates your cooperation. Graduates must report to the Papiano Gymnasium.

The schedule is as follows:

- **8:30 - 9 a.m.** Check in and pick up your graduation ID card.
- **9:30 a.m.** Graduates line up by academic division. Signs will be posted in the gymnasium.
- **10 a.m.** Procession
- **Noon Recession** (Please plan to stay for the entire event.)

Graduates will recess to the Presidential Courtyard. Ask your family and friends to meet you in that area after all the graduates have walked out of the event tent.
