


Profile of Historic Freedom Fighter: Harriet Tubman

Harriet Tubman was a woman who was born in Maryland who escaped slavery and helped hundreds of others to escape slavery as well.

Tubman (born Araminta Ross, and later took her mother's first name and was married to John Tubman) became a leading abolitionist, and was born in Maryland in 1820. She was born to enslaved parents and her family went through a lot of physical violence at the hands of her slave master.

When she was a teenager a man told Tubman to help restrain a

The Career Center has announced that it is sponsoring a free two-credit college experience course and two Federal job applications workshops for the current spring semester at both the college's Blackwood and Camden City Campuses.

Professional Development Curve

The two-credit college experience course is designed to get enrollees ahead of the professional development power curve, according to Pranzatelli.

Criteria for Honors' Program


Scholarships Exclusively for Students

runaway slave. Since Harriet refused to do so, the overseer threw a two pound weight at her head, after which, she suffered from severe headaches, seizures, and narcoleptic episodes.

Tubman Escapes Slavery in 1849

When Tubman was an adult she escaped slavery in 1849 to flee to Philadelphia. She escaped following a bout with illness and the death of her owner. Harriet went back to help her family and other slaves to escape to live in Philadelphia.

In 1850, the Fugitive Slave Law was passed which meant that escaped slaves in the North could be sent back to Slavery. So Tubman re-routed the Underground

The image of Harriet Tubman, the iconic Underground Railroad Conductor who helped blacks to escape slavery in the South on her "railroad", will appear on the front of new \$20 bills scheduled for circulation in the year 2020. After escaping her own enslavement in 1849, Tubman, nicknamed "Moses", guided at least 300 slaves (captive Africans in bondage) to freedom, including many of her family members.

Railroad to Canada. During the Civil War, Tubman worked as a cook, nurse, armed scout and spy.

First Woman to Lead Fight

Tubman was the first woman to lead an armed expedition in the war. Since Tubman was getting older her head injuries became more severe. Harriet died of pneumonia in 1913 while surrounded by family and friends. Harriet Tubman's courage, bravery and determination made her become an American icon.

Note: Because the birth years and deaths records of slaves were sometimes kept inaccurately, it is only known that Harriet Tubman was alive as of 1822. She died on March 10, 1913. She was buried with military honors in Fort Hill Cemetery in New York.




circumstances of individuals, families and communities.

In May 1988, Volunteers of America Delaware Valley dedicated this homeless shelter in honor of Anna M. Sample, a woman who devoted her life to fighting poverty in the City of Camden.

The Father of Black History Month, Carter G. Woodson, was born in 1875 near New Canton, Virginia. He was the son of former slaves. In 1907, he obtained his bachelor of arts degree from the University of Chicago. In 1912, he received his Ph.D. from Harvard University.

In 1915, he and friends established the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. A year later, the *Journal of Negro History*, began quarterly publication. In 1926, Woodson proposed and launched the annual February observance of Negro History Week, which became Black History Month in 1976.

It is said that he chose February for the observance because February 12th was the birthday of President Abraham Lincoln, the so-called Great Emancipator and February 14th was the birthday of Frederick Douglass, a

noted abolitionist and one of the first heroes of the Civil Rights Movement.

Dr. Woodson was the founder of Associated Publishers, the founder and editor of the *Negro History Bulletin*, and the author of more than 30 books. His best known publication is *The Mis-Education of the Negro*, originally published in 1933 and still pertinent today.


He died in 1950, but Dr. Woodson's scholarly legacy goes on.

MUSIC COLUMN: Making the Case for Selecting Rapper Tupac Shakur to Rock and Roll Hall of Fame

Being in the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame is an honor that many artists dream of but very few ever achieve in their career.

Being in the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame is one of the hardest things to be a part of. You can be nominated after 25 years of your first EP, album, or song. To get in you must have impacted the world musically and have a body of work that few can disagree of being worthy. With that said, getting in on your first try is even harder.

Only about 53 artists including

inductees this year have even been nominated on their first try. No one from this class deserves this honor more than Tupac Shakur.

Tupac Brought Rap Music to Mainstream Audience

Tupac Shakur helped to define Rap music and to bring it to the mainstream audience. Tupac’s music has influenced so many rappers, artists and people in general. Some of his songs talked about sex, drug, and violence. While thoughts about the lyrics of those songs may seem wrong, he will not be remembered for those songs or for the unforgivable things that he done in the past.

Tupac Shakur’s music talked about the struggles of living in the hood, racial problems in the world, death, and other controversial topics. One of his songs, “So Many Tears” talked about his past and tragedies that he saw and faced in his life. He talked about seeing his friends getting murdered, being in jail, religion and God, and he talked about what would be his untimely death before it even happened.

Tupac’s Music Spoke to Millions

Another song for example, “Dear Mama” talked about the struggles his mom faced, apologized for his bad choices in life, his actions, and his hope to provide her a better life. This is the gift that Tupac Shakur had. His music spoke to millions of people

around the world and talked about problems that people still face in their lives today. It can not be underestimated the impact that “2pac” had on people from different ways of life, races and social class.

He has been dead for over 20 years now and still has an impact in the world. You go to any city now whether it’s Philadelphia, New York, Los Angeles, or anywhere and you are bound to hear one of his songs or see someone wearing a t-shirt of his. Tupac died sadly at the age of 25 years old but has sold over 75 million albums in the world. He wrote and placed a number one album on the charts while he was in jail. He has influenced countless artists and rappers’ careers like Drake, J Cole and Eminem.

Tupac Shaped Genre of Music

Whether you thought that he was a good or bad person in general, there is no denying that he helped to define and shape a genre of music that people at the time thought would be dead today. If Tupac Shakur was left out of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, then it would be a huge shame and tragedy. While there are other artists like Janet Jackson, Depeche Mode, Whitney Houston, The Cure and other artists who should be in the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, there is no one on the list or eligible to be on it who should be inducted in the Hall of Fame more than Tupac.

Meets Criteria for Selection

The goal of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame is to induct artists from ANY genre of music who helped to define it. Even though 2pac may not be a rock artist, he more than fills the bill in this case. It’s just a real shame that he has passed away and wouldn’t be able to receive the award and honor in person. However, the impact that he has made will live on in the millions of people that he has influenced and the music that he has left behind.

Other music artists who will be inducted this year are Joan Baez, ELO, Journey, Pearl Jam, Yes and Nile Rodgers.

Donates to Protect Environment

This is how she earned her famous nickname, “Beach Lady” for her dedication and numerous efforts to protect the inhabitants of the beach. She gave her life savings (approximately \$750,000) to sixty environmental organizations and causes, ten of which she was a lifetime member. Betsch was also featured on CBS, CNN and had articles in Southern Living, Coastal Living, Essence, and

Smithsonian.

Even after being diagnosed with cancer in 2002, which caused the removal of her stomach. “Beach Lady” continued on her missions that help and benefit others. She made plans for the American Beach Museum that opened in 2014.

Her sister, Dr. Johnnetta Betsch Cole, president of Bennett College for women in Greensboro, N.C., was also the president of Spelman College, a women’s college in Atlanta, Ga.

MaVynne Betsch passed away on September 5, 2005, at her home on American Beach.

Educational Information and Resource Center Occupies 3 Levels of CCC Library

The Educational Information and Resource Center (EIRC) has officially relocated to their new facility at Camden County College. Over the past few years, EIRC has seen immense growth. The agency, which was created by state legislation in 1968, currently serves over 73% of New Jersey’s public school districts. The new location at 200 College Drive in Blackwood, NJ accommodates the expansion of EIRC and allows for future advancement.

Advocates for Students with Disabilities

At Camden County College, EIRC occupies three levels of the current Wolverton Library. The top level of the building is now home to the Learning Resource Center-South (LRC-S), a grant project within the EIRC. Dedicated to including students with disabilities in general education classrooms, LRC-S provides a comprehensive collection of information, resources, and services for educators and families located within the seven southern counties of New Jersey. The LRC-S has an extensive lending library including professional literature, curriculum resources, and hands-on kits/manipulatives. Members are encouraged to borrow the available resources to support student achievement in classrooms and in the home. LRC-S also operates a van outreach program (available to registered districts) that serves schools via onsite delivery of resources and materials. In addition to the extensive educational collection, educators have access to a production area that teachers can use to create learning activities and centers.

EIRC and LRC-S welcome educators and families to see how their services can work for their students and children and make an impact on education. Membership for the LRC – South is \$2.00 per year, payable by cash or check upon joining. 
